The Korean Peninsula remains a divided land.

Next year will mark the 80th anniversary of Liberation Day, but it will also signify 80 years of division.



Importantly,

The Korean Peninsula is still in a state of ceasefire
—meaning the war is not officially over

In this context,

I would like to highlight recent reconciliation efforts by civil society organizations, churches, Christian youth, and others.



230,000 signatures

On July 27, 2023

the 70th anniversary of the Armistice

- Ceasing hostilities and improving North-South and North-North American relations.
- Ending the Korean War and signing a peace agreement.
- Achieving a Korean Peninsula and world free of nuclear weapons and threats.
- Resolving conflicts through dialogue and cooperation, rather than sanctions and military threats.
- Ending military cooperation between South Korea and Japan to achieve peaceful coexistence on the Korean Peninsula and in Asia.
- Breaking the cycle of arms races and investing in citizen safety and environmental protection.

In 1981, church leaders from both sides met for the first time in Glion, Switzerland

Declaration of the Korean Christian Church on the Unification and Peace of the Peoples

This declaration aimed to overcome antagonism and recognize the shared Christian identity, fostering dialogue and reconciliation.

For three years


Workshops highlighted:
